

It is some time since I included the latest stamp news, so I thought that you might like to see some of the higher values again. I must admit that the number of these that I have seen coming through my letterbox, suitably cancelled of course, is a large zero. I always live in hope.

This is the highest value from the first January set showing scenes from TV's The Vicar of Dibley. I wonder what Letitia

had put in her sandwiches for Vicar Geraldine. The next one is also from a January set, this time celebrating the Royal Armouries. It is difficult to imagine Henry VIII wearing something like this, but it was intended for his younger days. February brought AC/DC to our envelopes and perhaps your memories. Not being a rock fan this was one set that didn't do much for me, but I did notice this stamp relating to an event in Boston. It reminds me that there is another Boston event in a few months. For my fourth choice I have come to the Mythical beasts, brought to us in March. This first class stamp is of a Selkie that can shapeshift between seal and human forms.

Mike Bolt

President Portsmouth & District Philatelic Society

Mike joined the Portsmouth & District Philatelic Society in 1985, and became a committee member in 1986. Mike served the society as packet superintendent from 1994, meetings secretary from 1996 and programme secretary in 1999. In 2005 he was elected president and also took on the role of auctioneer. Mike took on the work of treasurer after the loss of John Campbell during Covid and adjusted the system to meet current needs. As well as organising his often unusual president's evening, he also provided the Christmas Quiz, a challenge of philatelic and general knowledge, stumping most members, supported by mince pies and a tombola raffle.




As a philatelist Mike was presented with the Micklam Award in 1995 for Long and Valued Service to the society, and between 1990 and 1999 he won a series of society and federation awards including the William Cox Cup, the Alvington Cup, Thematic Class Competition and the Marmion Cup. There is no award for turning up to almost every meeting with a smile, listening patiently and keeping the show on the road when volunteers are hard to find; the Portsmouth Society is very fortunate to have had Mike Bolt as a member.

Many of our members belong to adjacent local societies, some large and others small and local; Portsmouth has a very relaxed, friendly atmosphere, reflecting the commitment, effort and enthusiasm of Mike who was a gentle, unassuming man, combining a good sense of fun with his extensive philatelic knowledge.

William (Bill) Edward Trower 1930-2025




It was with deep regret that we received the sad news that one of the stalwarts of Essex philately, Bill Trower, passed away on 28th July. An engineer by profession, Bill was, for many years until its closure in 2018, the chairman of Hullbridge society and a member of Rayleigh. Hullbridge was the last Essex society to have a separate junior society under its wing, with Bill active in supporting junior philately. His main field of study was American aerophilately and he was a senior member of the British Aerophilatelic Federation, later the British Air Mail Society, although

he had much wider interests, generally with a leaning towards the USA. From 1976-1978, Bill was AEPS Assistant Secretary, then, from 2013-2016, he served as its president, having been vice president 2010-2013. He was awarded Life Membership in 2018. Bill was a frequent participant in competition, at home and abroad, on one occasion being surprised to receive a four-feet high trophy from a competition in, if memory serves, the Philippines! Bill's humour and friendship will be deeply missed by his many friends.

David Hooper 1928-2025

On 3rd September 2025 David Hooper passed away peacefully – he had just turned 97 and is believed to have been one of Bristol's longest serving members becoming an Honorary Life Member in November 2020 when Bristol Philatelic Society members visited his home with his certificate. One particularly recalls an event when he made an unusual display of postal hardware including several heavy cast-iron Victorian post boxes, which he managed to get upstairs and down again without mishap – probably won't see the like again. Another member recalls his BR1stOL FIRSTS collection and display being both outstanding and delightfully impressive.



Dr Stewart Nairn Gardiner (22/12/1945 - 3/8/2025)

Born in Newcastle, Stewart's family moved to Glasgow when he was quite young. He did his schooling in Glasgow including a degree in Natural Philosophy ('Physics') at Glasgow University and a PhD in Nuclear Physics. Although he worked in that field for a year or two, he soon moved into the IT business where he spent the rest of his working life, latterly in a consulting role on large IT contracts. After a few years working in Australia and then in London, he moved back to Glasgow which he regarded as his home town.

Stewart had a lifelong interest in philately. I recall stories of his first forays into the hobby at the age of 8, visiting one of the Glasgow stamp shops and using



his meagre cash very discerningly (unlike the rest of us, Stewart ignored the large colourful stamps showing butterflies and football), cursing that he could not afford the more expensive gems on offer. Along the way, Stewart changed from being a mere stamp collector to a serious philatelist with a keen interest in the printing of stamps and in postal history. His attention to detail reflected the scientist in Stewart.

In Australia, he was an active member of the Canberra Philatelic Society, winning a Certificate of Participation with an early exhibit! He was a member of the Glasgow-based

Caledonian Philatelic Society for more than 50 years and a member (then Fellow) of the Royal for almost as long. Stewart played a very active role in the three Glasgow societies and entertained societies across Scotland with his seemingly endless range of interesting material.

Stewart represented the Royal North of the Border for many years and organized an annual meeting for Scottish members. He never understood the reticence of others to show off their material.

So what did Stewart collect? It is difficult to label his interests. He described himself as a philatelic dabbler. He loved buying lots of mixed material at auction and was rarely disappointed with the outcome. The Auction Houses will miss him!!

Reflecting the demands of his business career, Stewart took to exhibiting quite late. But, with his usual determination, he regularly won competitions at club and annual Scottish Congress. But he was most proud of his exhibit - 'Sealing and Securing the Letter' - at EuroPhilEx (May 2025). He had great fun with his journey from a 3-frame exhibit at Scottish Congress to an 8-frame International exhibit. Along the way, Stewart was awarded the prestigious Lee Medal by the Royal for a Zoom display of his exhibit. The end result was a high quality and most attractive (artist meets scientist?) exhibit. I had the pleasant task of phoning him to tell him the result - a Large Gold. A telephone call I will never forget! Summing up Stewart's contribution to philately, I can do no better than quote a senior figure at the Royal who wrote on hearing the news "Terrible news. Stewart was a tower of strength in Scottish philately." We will all miss him and our thoughts are with his wife, Denise.

The universal reaction to news of Stewart's death has been what a gentleman (and gentle man) he had been, friendly and generous in so many ways, with a very dry sense of humour. Since his retirement, Stewart and I met regularly for coffee. These occasions were always fun and we always put the world (philatelic and real) to right. Sadly, he could never properly explain the theory of relativity to me. I will miss him dearly.

Paul Green - Nominated by Association of Essex Philatelic Societies

Paul has served the Association in a wide variety of roles since 1964 including president, secretary, and service to the Executive Committee for 41 years and the Inter-County Cup Committee for 31 years.

Rodney Knight – Nominated by the Spanish Study Circle

Rodney has been chairman of the Spanish Study Circle for more than 20 years and can be found promoting the society at York Stamp Fair, Midpex and other stamp fairs where societies are invited. He currently indexes the journal of the National Philatelic Society.

David McMann - Nominated by Grimsby & District Philatelic Society

David joined the local society in 2000 and quickly became embroiled in their activities, especially the annual charity auction for the local hospice. From the first came a modest cheque of £350, this year's cheque was £5400. He is kept busy at stamp fairs where he has a stand selling donated material. David supplies packet of stamps for sale in three of the hospice's charity shops. All his efforts have raised £153 500 for the charity and he has no intention of retiring.

Ivor Moore – Nominated by Borneo Philatelic Society

Ivor has been the auctioneer of the Sarawak Specialists Society now the Borneo Philatelic Society for an astonishing 47 years. Two physical auctions are held each year with approximately 600 lots usually exceeding £50 000 in sales. He does all the work himself, collecting collections, describing and lotting, conducting the auction then despatching the sold lots to all parts of the

world. He was the organising secretary for the 58th Philatelic Congress of Great Britain in 1976.



Andy Taylor – Nominated by Austrian Philatelic Society
Andy joined the Austrian Philatelic Society in the mid-1980s
and has been one of its most active members ever since.
He edited the society's journal for 25 years. The journal has
won many awards. He was treasurer for eight years as well
as serving as president, webmaster, and editor at the same
time. He has organised conferences and exhibitions for the
society and edited several of the books the society has
published. If ever a job needed doing, Andy has always
been the one to step forward.

Mike Wilesmith – Nominated by Harrogate Philatelic Society

Mike was elected to the committee of the Harrogate Philatelic Society in 1998 and has served in various ways ever since then. He took charge of the society's library and when the library was damaged by flooding, he arranged the salvage of the books. He has served as president on two occasions and as treasurer until a serious vision problem forced his resignation. Not willing to retire he became the chief liaison officer with the Visual Impairment Centre where the society holds its meetings. He organises the annual dinner and the meeting refreshments.

The Winner of Best in Show was **Joseph Hackmey** with his Traditional class display of *Classic South Australia*

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
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"What is Postal History?"

Report on the Seminar 24th Sept 2025

Sixty-three attendees gathered at RPSL for this event. If asked "Are you a Postal Historian?" some would have replied "Yes" some "Not Sure" and others would have echoed the title - "It Depends, What is Postal History?"

These notes are only a very brief summary; the links to the YouTube recordings of the presentations will be found on the SRT website **www.rossitertrust.com** with the PowerPoint presentations from the speakers.

The Corresponding Trustee **Andy Gould FRPSL** opened the event with some background on Stuart Rossiter the man, and on his eponymous Trust.

James Grimwood Taylor RDP FRPSL's presentation entitled *Was the Most Important Event in Postal History the Invention of the Postage Stamp?* suggested various other possibilities. Starting with the invention of writing, the production of paper, creation of Royal Mail, postal charges, postal stationery etc etc.

Douglas N Muir RDP FRPSL's presentation *Must Postal History have a Stop?* We can (and do) collect artefacts about postal history but cannot and do not actually collect history – it being the study of events. It included an extract of film about the first machine to sort the mail, and another in which Douglas was interviewing David Gentlemen, designer of many British postage stamps. The short answer to the opening question is *No, history doesn't stop; therefore, postal history doesn't stop.*

After lunch **Theo Brauers** talked on *The Treatment of Mail on the Continent*. This is a highly complex area with problems relating to varying routes, multi-currency rates, and multiple postal conventions. Attendees admired his diligence and achievement, though several expressed relief that they personally had chosen less taxing areas to research.

Nigel Gooch FRPSL *Is Postal History only Rates, Routes and Postmarks?* Using examples from his collection of Iran Nigel showed confusing rates, obscure routes and postmarks in Farsi. He was then able to show that these illustrate: a cholera epidemic, postcard tax, postal agency in Turkey, alternative uses for registration labels, famine, and regime change, etc. Again, the short answer to the question is *No*.


Birthe King RDP FRPSL is well-known for promoting Open Philately and her presentation was *An Open Goal...* Her approach is that we can include whatever we like in our collections. Rules only apply if and when we want to enter competitions. The main difference between Postal History Class 2C and Open Philately is the amount of non-philatelic material used. In Postal History the non-philatelic material must have close relation to the philatelic items and illustrate these. In Open Philately the non-philatelic material must illustrate the philatelic items and bring the story forward. Birthe illustrated the differences with pages from her Postal History and Open Philately displays. She ended with *enjoy your collecting*, *displaying*, *and exhibiting*.

Wolfgang Maassen's presentation was *The Next Steps?* - this is research, documentation and publication. He emphasised the importance of using primary sources for research, not relying on what has been published before, the results

of this research need to be documented carefully and then published. Otherwise, it is all for nothing! Your good work is lost. Wolfgang publishes a journal, four times a year, downloadable as pdf from www.philahistorica.de At the close, James Podger FRPSL, who had acted as Master of Ceremonies all day, thanked the Royal PS staff for their organisation and catering, and Mark Bailey for his IT expertise.

This was an International event, with speakers from the UK, Germany, Belgium and Denmark. The audience also included visitors from USA and Canada. We were particularly pleased to meet **Marty Bratzel** from Canada as the SRT has sponsored his publications about the Cameroons.

Modern Postal History. Emergency Post in Somalia. 1991- 92.

During the 1980s the Somalia Government disintegrated resulting in anarchy, as rival war lords fought each other for territorial gain. In the ensuing mayhem normal postal service had by 1990 ceased to operate. When stamps ran out in Mogadishu prepaid mail was accepted and franked with a single line cachet PORT PAYE plus other various Post Office cachets. Examples seen are Customs, Savings Bank and Parcel Cachets, this practice lasting from around the middle of 1990 until September 1991 when it is presumed that the postal system ceased completely.



Following the breakdown of the postal system mail was handled by ICRC (International Red Cross Committee) who processed the mail in late 1991 with just a serial number in manuscript. Then in the period December 1991-January 1992, mail was forwarded to Nairobi, Kenya where Kenyan stamps were affixed, a serial number still in manuscript applied, with a VIA ICRC in red backstamp. PO Box 73226, Nairobi, Kenya in manuscript was also applied on the reverse before being passed into the postal system.



Then in the period March to May 1992 mail was treated as before except that it received a machine serial number front and back in lieu of the manuscript serial number to the front.



Sometime in 1992 the practice of franking individual letters with Kenyan stamps was subsequently discontinued, the ICRC then forwarding mail in bulk to the BBC in London.

Other interesting examples of Somalia mail being taken to surrounding countries for forwarding to the BBC in London exist but are outside the scope of this short article.

This Modern Postal History was made available by Dr Graham Mytton who at the time was Head of Audience Research BBC World Service. It was passed to a number of Philatelic Societies in the Home Counties by Graham and Mr John Ager. All proceeds being donated to the Save the Children Fund.

Artificial Intelligence for Philatelists

Anyone having difficulty identifying strange looking stamps? – The Google Lens app is invaluable. You may find it already on your smartphone, if you dare own such a thing. Using it is straightforward; it takes a picture with the phone camera and searches the web for similar images, directing the user to various websites featuring a similar image (and what other people say it is). In many cases, it will provide a summary telling you what it believes the stamp to be. It's often quicker than using a catalogue too.


I've also used the ChatGPT application (free version) to create summaries of a country's philatelic history for album frontispieces. It's fairly fast and where plenty of data exists and there is consensus within that data, then it rarely produces garbage (which is what most people worry about).

It can also generate images if you provide a short brief. Here is my image for an introduction to my stamps of the Caucasus created from this brief: a colourful image / montage of the Caucasus highlighting some of the main landmarks and culture. The result shown below, is a single, flowing scene of the Caucasus, blending landscapes, architecture, culture, and wildlife into one panorama. Asked what it contained ChatGPT replied:

- * Snow-capped mountains rise in the background, with a winding blue river cutting through green hills.
- * Historic churches and watchtowers dot the landscape, their red-tiled roofs standing out against the greenery.
- * A large statue of a woman holding a sword (similar to Tbilisi's Mother of Georgia) stands prominently in the middle ground.
- * In the foreground, a man in traditional Caucasian attire (red chokha with cartridge holders and papakha hat) plays a woodwind instrument, possibly a duduk or zurna.
- * Beside him, a woman in a red and gold traditional dress stands calmly.
- * A colourful woven carpet and pottery jar rest at their feet.
- * On the right, a dancing couple in matching yellow-and-green costumes perform a folk dance.
- * A wild goat (ibex) grazes near some stone towers, symbolizing the mountain wildlife of the region

Channel Islands

At the AGM in July French Canadian member **André Dufresne RNCP** was awarded the John Hirst Salver for his series of articles in *Les Iles Normandes* on the artwork for the Isle of Jethou carriage labels. A total of 13 members attended our meeting on 13th September in London. The theme for the meeting was

postcards. The morning began with a 48-lot room auction generating sales of £270. A compulsorily registered cover sent from Sark to Austria in 1983 struck with a '£1.00' TO PAY/POSTED UNPAID handstamp, realised £80 against a reserve of £5! To complete the morning programme, Richard Flemming showed Corbière Lighthouse postcards and his wife Jill Flemming showed postcards of Guernsey Churches and Hotels. The afternoon session started with Steve Wells

showing a number of court cards, the earliest form of the picture postcard, which were only permitted to be sent by the Post Office from September 1894. The display included the earliest known Guernsey postcard sent in May 1897 to Germany. Nick Stuart showed postcards relating to Victor Hugo and Brian Austin Jersey Liberation Postcards. David Winnie gave a 32-sheet display of Herm-related Postcards, including scarce Thomas Bramley and Tuck cards: he explained that this display of postcards had not seen the light of day since the 1980s! Simon Burke followed with a 50-sheet display of Sark Postcards, the earliest dating from 1894. and, John Triggs showed 15 Guernsey Postcards. Finally, Nick Martin showed 16 Chausey Postcards bearing Hotel Cachets.

The Czechoslovak PS of GB

Gerhard Hanacek gave a Zoom presentation on *The Theresienstadt Ghetto* in October. His collection gave a thought-provoking insight into the chilling bureaucracy of the holocaust. Ghetto mail was handled in Prague by The Jewish Council of Elders in Prague. For recipients outside Prague mail was sent in collective envelopes to the respective branch offices. In November 1941, 340

Jewish craftsmen were sent to Theresienstadt to construct accommodation there - for just five days they were permitted to send mail back to Prague, but this was stopped by the SS to prevent news of their work leaking out. An extremely rare example was shown dated 28th November 1941. One rare (and heartbreaking) postcard to Theresienstadt was from Buchenwald concentration camp with the message 'A hike for two through the Beskids, a tango in the Bristol – you in your most beautiful dress, a beautifully set

table with all our loved ones – just courage and a healthy 1943'. To regulate parcels traffic an 'admission stamp' was produced. With much supporting materials, Gerhard showed how the system worked. Stamps were printed in sheets of 25, originally in black but subsequently in green, symbolizing nature. Proofs, blocks of four, imperforate stamps and colour varieties were all included, together with examples used on piece. The final section of the presentation focused on the 18th century Small Fortress of Theresienstadt, used by the Gestapo as a transit camp for Czech resistance members on their way to the concentration camps.

during the 1945-6 Hyperinflation: Early Polish Meter Mail; Pneumatic Mail in Prague: Use of Austrian Stamps in Austrian Galicia (Southern Poland) from 1850; Austrian Parcel Cards from 1945-54 under Zonal Occupation; Charity Stamps of Austria from 1922-1938; Polish Fieldpost in France and the UK.1939-45; 2025 Austrian Stamp Issues for the Bicentenary of the Birth of Johan Strauss the Younger: Czech Postal Inflation 1918-1922: pre-WWI East Prussian TPO Cancellations and finally. Czech 1945 War Hero Stamps used on mail to the various occupied zones

The long-standing tradition that the first meeting in the new season is a display from the Royal Philatelic Collection continued this year with material from the Northern Area of the Caribbean. By gracious permission of His Majesty King Charles III. members were able to enjoy displays of *The Leeward Islands*. Cayman Islands and Dominica spanning the reigns of Victoria to George VI, arranged by Rod Vousden FRPSL, Acting Keeper of the Royal Philatelic Collection. The display featured many unique items, including proofs, colour trials and 'SPECIMEN' examples, plus truly exquisite original artwork, usually hand-painted and some executed stamp size. Ayrshire

We opened our 2025/26 programme in Prestwick on 2nd September with the traditional President's Night when new president Peter Smith gave a fascinating talk and display on his native Australia amplified by a PowerPoint presentation. Beginning with his boyhood in Bruny Island, Tasmania, and featuring a number of entertaining anecdotes, he then moved on to his philatelic interests. Among the many highlights was "the second Penny Black" SG1 of Western Australia. issued in 1854, featuring the Black Swan. Interestingly this stamp was briefly used as currency during the Gold Rush of the 1850s when the supply of copper coins from the UK could not match the demands of the huge influx of emigrants seeking their fortunes. Peter also showed a range of interesting Victorian Boer War and Consumption (tuberculosis) Charity stamps and described how for three years after Federation in 1901 Western Australian stamps, along with the five other States, were valid for postage across the whole continent. Several sheets of postmarks were displayed demonstrating this. Peter pointed out how Australia's aboriginal and convict heritage has only comparatively recently been properly acknowledged philatelically, and he himself had only been able to learn of his own convict heritage fairly late in life. Peter concluded his display with a few sheets of the idiosyncratic Hutt River issues, a self-declared principality in West Australia. Ken Gibb

The P Allam Postal History Cup was won by Frank Griffiths with a collection entitled Private Ship Letters & The Caribbean. Postal history concerns postmarks, how mail is transported, how stamps are used in philately, and how covers help us understand how societies use postal communication, methods of transport, special markings on envelopes that tell a story about the letter's journey, and postal routines, among other things. The S T Birkin Modern Stamp Trophy for modern philately and postal history in the last 50 years was won by **Heather Lawn** with a fine display of *Pre-Decimal Machin* Stamps. The display showed mounted mint 1902 Edward VII stamps followed by unmounted mint stamps – 1934-36 George V definitives, 1993-2011 Machins by 3 different printers – De La Rue, Enschedé, and Harrison and 1992-95 Castles printed by Harrison. *Graham Harker*

Dawlish



John explained how many of the confederate covers did not have stamps on them but that cash was paid at various points of transit, by the sender and recipient, to those involved in transferring the mail. John outlined how his material linked with various battlefields such as Gettysburg, in 1863. A vote of thanks was given to John on behalf of an appreciative audience for his extremely interesting and informative presentation – undoubtedly one of, if not, the best collection on this theme in the UK.

He explained that, broadly, tree species are either coniferous (evergreen) or deciduous (with broad leaves which are shed in winter). although the classification of trees into groups is more complex. Sandy set the scene by stating that trees have played a vital role throughout human history. Apart from food. they provide shelter and clothing, tools and fuel, the wheels of transport, wheels that generate power and much more. He stressed the importance of trees in forming the atmosphere, and their role in cleaning and enriching the air we breathe. He displayed stamps with the relevant trees to explain this.

drawn from around the world, starting with conifers. This was done alphabetically to illustrate the different tree types. He addressed the question What do trees give us and how are these products applied? Over a further 10 frames Sandy explored tree-related food types and products, flowers, aircraft and gliders over the years. Also pleasure pursuits: sports such as tennis and cricket, sailing boats and horse-drawn wooden vehicles. He also considered the Mighty Oaks which were used extensively in shipbuilding for warships and merchant vessels over the centuries; house building construction (using timber from across the world), as well as the use of timber in the interior of churches and cathedrals etc. With over 100 sheets on display Sandy illustrated in his final frames the role of wood within musical instruments from across the world.

Over 2 million tickets were sold when the New Zealand population was less than 1 million. To publicize the event a record-breaking attempt was made to fly from New Zealand to Australia with commemorative letters. After 500 miles halfway across the sea one of the two engines stopped. A crew member crawled along the wing to pour oil into the remaining engine. Half the mail bags were dumped and the plane returned to base. The saved letters were then given a special survival postmark. We continued with scarce philatelic items from the WWI landing and evacuation at Gallipoli. Jack finished with Postcards from the 1908 USA White Battleship Fleet (ships painted white), which visited Auckland on its worldwide flag-waving cruise. New members are always welcome at our meetings, which are held at the Rochdale Unitarian Church on the second Tuesday of each month at 7.30 pm. Peter Grimshaw

Royal Sutton Coldfield



Report on my visit to STAMPEX

At the end of October I returned home somewhat tired after 5 days in London. Admittedly I went early in order to have a visit to the theatre and to be ready for an early start when the Business Design Centre opened to the public on the Wednesday. It was the second time that Stampex had been held in the smaller side section on two floors with some added stalls in the Gallery. Of course we all have dealers or auction houses that we usually see and I had no difficulty in finding those known to me and starting the process of deciding which of the goodies on show needed to find a new home with me. From the discussions I had with them and others during my time there it was clear that I was not the only one who had found much of interest.

I also helped on the Royal stand for a few hours. That gave the opportunity to talk to many visitors. Some of course are already members and just call round for a chat, but there were many who knew little or nothing of the society. The same must be true at other events, so it shows that we should take every opportunity to spread the word about the advantage of being a member of a society that mirrors our own interest. With the Royal sometimes the perception was that it was only for really serious and learned philatelists, but after a few minutes of talking to me (and others) they were soon disabused of that notion. Norfolk Postal History & Postcards - 'Poppyland'

'Poppyland' is the name given to the part of the North Norfolk coast between Cromer and

Mundesley and more particularly Overstrand and Sidestrand.

A Parsons Norman Postcard (Fig 1) showing the Poppy Fields at West Cliff Cromer sent in 1916 where the writer refers to the origins of the name Poppyland (Fig 2) for that part of Norfolk,



Why Poppyland? It all began in 1883 when an article appeared in the Daily Telegraph under the heading of 'Poppyland' written 'At a Farmhouse by the sea by a Holidaymaker'. The article had been written by Clement Scott (Fig 3) a journalist, poet, theatre critic and magazine editor mainly involved in the London scene. Like many of his contemporaries in the arts he came to love the area he called 'Poppyland' and wrote about its attractions for many years. (Fig 4)

(the church tower toppled onto the beach below in 1916). The poem was incorporated in the lyrics of a song entitled "A Summer Song" published by

Clement Scott on his first visit to Cromer discovered the Mill House (Fig 5) at Sidestrand and found accommodation with Miller Jermy and his daughter Louie (Fig 6) who ran the household and was to be later known as "The Maid of the Mill". Louie and the coastal villages were to captivate Scott which showed in his writings so much so that it attracted his poetic friends

Swinburne, Henry Irving and others to sample the idyllic setting and stay at the Miller's House.




Fig 7. Sidestrand Churchyard

Poppyland and Louie Jermy were to have a strong influence on Clement Scott and his writing. His poem "The Garden of Sleep" was composed in the Sidestrand Churchyard (Fig 7)

A number of local artists produced Poppyland paintings which were turned into postcards for sale to the visitors the most popular Artists being George Parsons Norman and Alfred de Breanski. These postcards can be found used with postmarks of Cromer (see left). Sheringham,

Sidestrand, Overstrand (see below), Mundesley and East Runton and possibly

other local Post Offices.

Authors Note:

The BBC broadcast a highly acclaimed play in January 1985 entitled "Poppyland" in its Screen Two Series which was based on Clement Scott's discovery of the Norfolk Coast and his friendship with Louie Jermy.

This play might still be available to be viewed on U-Tube.

FIP shows in Bratislava in July 2027 and Belgrade in September 2027 have been announced but no invitation has yet been received.

UK handling charges are now standardised for all international exhibitions at £30 per frame for shows in Europe or £35 for events anywhere else in the world, whether single or multiple frame exhibits or per literary entry. This is to cover the cost of getting exhibits to and from exhibitions, FIP capitation fees and other costs relating to processing the exhibits. Overall this runs at a loss. Exhibits that are carried to and returned from an exhibition by the exhibitor are charged at half price. There is no UK handling charge for Youth exhibits.
